Abstraction reform and the Abstraction Plan

- Significant progress has been made in reforming abstraction management.
- Key driver was the publication of the joint government and Environment Agency Water Abstraction Plan in 2017
- The Abstraction Plan has three main elements:
 - address unsustainable abstraction
 - develop a stronger catchment focus
 - modernise the abstraction service

Water Resources Licensing

- Abstraction Plan: Modernise the abstraction service
- Abstraction and impoundment of water is authorised through the granting of licences.
- Intention to move abstraction and impoundment licensing from:

The move into EPR is

- Switching licences for permits
- Moving to a consistent regulatory framework
- Not changing how we assess and manage water resources

During and after the move into EPR

- The EA plans to migrate your licence into the new system and will grant permits (not licences)
- We will **not make changes** to your existing licences or **re-issue** any documents on transition
- **Your existing licence document will be called a permit** and will continue to **authorise** your abstraction or impoundment

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What will change?

- Will have activities instead of licence types: reviewing how to have more than one activity on a permit and how to consolidate activities across regimes
- Adopt the standard permit format – tweaked for abstraction and impoundment
- Considering how to use the management condition
- Will not time limit permits - instead permits will be reviewable
